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Introduction

Farmers in Australia generally do not engage directly with how genetically modified organisms and genetically modified technologies are regulated. However, they are the primary market and producers of genetically modified crops, or a plant that has been modified through both GM and non-GM techniques.

Clear regulation is essential to ensure that plants for commercial cultivation meet the requirements described in the *Gene Technology Act 2000*, and its subsequent legislation as administered by the Office of the Gene Technology Regulator (OGTR). For all crops that farmers use, whether genetically modified or conventionally bred, there is the assumption that the crop has the appropriate approvals and will not cause adverse effects on people or the environment.

In Phase 1 of the consultation, WAFarmers asked for consideration of option 4 – exclude certain new technologies from regulation on the basis of the outcomes they produce. WAFarmers considers the implementation of option 3 – regulate some new technologies based on the process used, to be most in line with the current regulations. It provides clear direction to users of GM technologies, and an indicator of how emerging and developing technologies may be treated in the future under the current regulatory regime.

The Technical Review of the Gene Technology Regulations is an essential step to ensure that genetically modified technologies and the organisms they produce are covered or excluded from the legislation. Clarifying ambiguities that exist is essential to ensure effective regulation of genetically modified organisms.

1. What is your preferred option? Please explain why.

WAFarmers supports Option 2 - amend the GT regulations by introducing all elements of the draft amendments at Appendix C. WAFarmers are advocates for the right for farmers to farm as they choose, and appropriate legislations of gene technology enables farmer choice.

A number of the proposed changes provide further clarity to the regulations, and should be supported, whereas some changes are essential to ensure that the regulations adequately address the changing nature of gene technologies and genetically modified organisms.

The changes to a definition of a genetically modified organism are essential for the effective and ongoing regulation of gene technology in Australia. A clear definition that can be refined without continuously updating the legislation is important for clarity within the crop breeding industry, as well as to farmers that engage directly with the market.

The provision of clarity on a number of the undefined terms in the regulations would assist the industry and provide clear guidelines for genetically modified techniques.

2. Do the draft amendments clearly implement the measures described in Section 3 of the Consultation RIS? If not, which areas of the draft amendments do you think require additional clarification, and what clarification is needed?

WAFarmers supports the draft amendments as outlined in Section 3 of the Regulation Impact Statement.
